For the Year Ended June 30, 2024

This report is issued under the authority of Ark. Code Ann. § 10-3-2102(f)(1). Specifically, the report has been prepared from data contained in the Arkansas Administrative Statewide Information System (AASIS) and provides an overview of education grant funds disbursed to school districts and other entities. The information contained in the report has not been audited.

The attachments in this report provide listings of the recipients of the various programs funded through the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2024. Attachments are organized by classification of recipient (school district, charter school, etc.). Within each attachment, funding is further identified by program. Also included in this report are brief descriptions of programs and resources used to fund education in Arkansas. ADVANCED PLACEMENT INCENTIVE

The Advanced Placement (AP) Incentive program provided support to establish AP courses that are easily accessible and prepare students for admission to and success in a postsecondary educational environment. AP courses and exams provide high school students the opportunity to earn credit at most colleges and universities. The program paid for professional development support for teachers of AP and Pre-AP courses and for equipment and materials grants for AP teachers.

ALTERNATIVE LEARNING

School districts were required to provide an alternative learning environment (ALE) for students who demonstrated an inability to function in the standard learning environment. The ALE educational programs provided eligible students alternative classroom settings, as well as additional services to meet the needs of this group of at-risk students. ADE calculated ALE funds in the 2023-2024 school year by multiplying \$4,987 by the number of identified ALE students enrolled during the previous school year, pursuant to Arkansas law and ADE rules.

ARKANSAS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY, MASTER PRINCIPAL AND BONUS

The Arkansas Leadership Academy administers the Master Principal Program, which provides training programs and opportunities to expand the knowledge base and leadership skills of public school principals, teachers, superintendents, and other administrators, and school board members. Principals who achieve Master Principal status through the Arkansas Leadership Academy are eligible for incentive bonuses. Pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-1603, a \$9,000 bonus is paid annually for five years to full-time principals at Arkansas public school districts. An annual bonus of \$25,000 is paid to full-time principals who serve at a “high-need” public school district, as allowed by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-1604.

ASSESSMENT/END OF LEVEL TESTING

This line item pays awards of up to \$50 to schools for each student score of 3 or better on Advanced Placement exams. ADE also supports school districts by providing each student in grade 10 or 11 with the opportunity to take the ACT exam without charge, pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-18-1606. Funds are also used to provide concurrent classes to high school students. The Office of Innovation for Education (OIE) is funded by the Assessment appropriation and works with ADE and school districts in developing accountability systems that meet the changing educational needs of Arkansas students. This line item also supports a grant for hosting the online version of the Arkansas Civics exam, as required by Act 478 of 2017.

BETTER CHANCE GRANTS

Arkansas Better Chance Grants are administered by the Arkansas Department of Education - Division of Elementary and Secondary Education, to serve educationally-deprived children ages birth through 5 years, excluding those enrolled in kindergarten. Within the Arkansas Better Chance Program is the Arkansas Better Chance for School Success Program, which funds innovative and developmentally appropriate early childhood programs for educationally-deprived children ages 3 and 4. For the 2023-2024 school year, the distribution of funds was based on \$5,070 per child for classroom-based programs and \$1,894 per child for home-visiting programs.

BONDED DEBT ASSISTANCE

This aid, formerly known as Debt Service Funding Supplement, was provided to school districts to offset a portion of the existing debt burden incurred and to increase the amount of local revenue available for the maintenance and operation of schools. Bonded Debt Assistance funds are to be used for the payment of bonded debt.

Pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2503, the following calculation, which was based on a school district’s Principal and Interest Payment Schedule in effect and on file with ADE on January 1, 2005, was used to determine Bonded Debt Assistance. Each eligible district’s annual debt service payment was reduced by 10%. If a district demonstrated to the Commission for Arkansas Public School Academic Facilities and Transportation (Commission) that all or a portion of the 10% reduction in its scheduled debt payment was attributable to the support of academic facilities, the Commission reversed all or a portion of the 10% reduction by a percentage proportionate to the amount attributable to academic facilities. The remaining 90% (or greater if a percentage was reversed) of the principal and interest payment was divided by the total assessed value of the district and multiplied by 1,000 to calculate the required debt service mills. This product was multiplied by the State Wealth Index, multiplied by the prior-year three-quarter Average Daily Membership, and multiplied by a funding factor.

These funds were paid on or before August 1 and February 1 of each year. If a district qualified for Bonded Debt Assistance, the amount of aid was not changed as a result of refunding outstanding bonds in effect and on file with ADE on January 1, 2005. As the amount of state financial assistance decreases due to reductions in principal and interest payments, bond payoff, and increases in property assessments, the Commission distributes savings to the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP), in accordance with rules promulgated by the Commission.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

Funds are used to promote computer science education and build local capacity for computer science instruction.

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION TECHNICAL CENTERS OPERATIONS

Technology Coordinators in the education service cooperatives assisted local school districts by providing technology training, advising districts in software/hardware purchases, and overseeing technology laboratories. The maximum amount of funds available to each of the State's 15 education service cooperatives and a central Arkansas district was set by the State Board of Education. The maximum amount was \$80,000.

COORDINATED SCHOOL HEALTH

These funds are used to promote health, wellness, and academic achievement in Arkansas's public schools and were awarded to districts through a competitive grant application. Grantees established school-based health centers to provide students with basic physical, mental, dental, and/or other services as needed. The program was a collaboration of the ADE Office of School Health Services, Arkansas Department of Health, and Arkansas Department of Human Services.

DECLINING ENROLLMENT

Beginning with Act 21 of the 1st Extraordinary Session of 2006 [Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2305(a)(3)], this program provided additional funding to school districts with a prior-year Average Daily Membership (ADM) that was less than the ADM of the year prior to the previous year. Funding was equal to the difference between the average of the ADM for the two immediately preceding years and the ADM for the previous school year, multiplied by the amount of foundation funding per student. School districts cannot receive both declining enrollment funding and student growth funding in the same year. (Act 909 of 2021 changed the law to allow districts to receive both declining enrollment and special needs isolated funding in the same year.)

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION SCHOOL SYSTEM

Ark. Code Ann. §§ 12-29-301 – 12-29-305 established the Corrections School System and provided that the cost of running the Corrections School System be borne by the Department of Correction, the Department of Community Correction, and ADE.

DISTANCE LEARNING

The distance learning operations program pays part of connectivity charges for public schools in Arkansas. It also pays for Hanover Research surveys studies and Educational Co-operatives to assist public schools in creating online and/or blended learning environments, including planning, implementation, and evaluation of digital courses; professional development; and web-based technologies on the ADE Data Center along with supporting Software, Platform and Infrastructure as a service needs to fulfill various program data collection, analytics, insights, monitoring, and evaluation. It supports emerging technologies in instruction, assessment, interventions, and support systems, including the Arkansas Digital Locker to support sharing/collaboration of digital files. Additionally, it covers a portion of the cost of student IT Microsoft Imagine academies, including Certiport testing and the agency's primary mode of communication via FERPA-compliant Microsoft email tenant and e-Discovery tool with schools, district/co-ops, over government and private entities.

EARLY CHILDHOOD SPECIAL EDUCATION

This program provided special education services to preschool children ages 3 to 5 with disabilities and served as state Medicaid match for physical, occupational, and speech therapy services. A portion of the appropriation was used to provide partial reimbursement for Early Childhood Coordinators and certain other program coordination costs.

EARLY INTERVENTION DAY TREATMENT SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

Early Intervention Day Treatment (EIDT) Special Education Services are supplemental State Special Education Preschool funds that were appropriated to supplement the increased costs of providing early childhood special education services.

EASTER SEALS

This program funded the cost of educational services provided by Easter Seals to children ages 3 to 21 who have orthopedic and/or communicative disorders. This funding reduced the amount that local school districts had to pay for these educational services and also qualified the facility as "state-supported" so that federal funds were available to further reduce the cost of services to local districts.

ECONOMIC EDUCATION

The objective of this program was to increase the economic literacy of students in grades pre-K through 12 by providing economic and personal finance education and training to teachers. Funding was distributed to the Arkansas Council on Economic Education (now conducting business as Economics Arkansas), a private, nonprofit organization providing certified professional development for teachers of grades K through 12.

EDUCATION RENEWAL ZONES

The Office of Educational Renewal Zones (ERZs) is responsible for creating a partnership between higher education and K-12 public education and using evidence-based practices to support schools and teachers in providing student-focused education. The purpose of an education renewal zone is to identify and implement education and management strategies designed specifically to improve public school performance and student academic achievement statewide, with special focus on the public schools in need of the specialized support and services provided by education renewal zones; provide collaboration among the State's smaller schools and school districts to achieve some of the advantages of economics of scale in providing educational and related activities; maximize benefits and outcomes of public schooling by coordinating available resources to improve public school performance and student academic achievement through a collaborative, statewide effort; and enable schools to make the best use of the latest cost-effective distance learning technology to enhance curricula and professional development opportunities.

EDUCATION SERVICE COOPERATIVES

The 15 education service cooperatives around the State facilitated sharing of resources and services between local school districts and provided a core support system for professional development.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

This program served students identified as not being proficient in the English language, enabling school districts to provide specially-trained staff, instructional materials, and training for teachers of these students. Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2305(b)(3)(A) sets out the dollar amount to be paid to districts each school year for each student identified as an English language learner. The rate per student for the school year was \$366.

ENHANCED STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT FUNDING

This program provided state categorical funding for students from low socioeconomic backgrounds, as indicated by prior-year eligibility for free or reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch (NSL) Act, as reported on October 1 of each year and submitted to ADE.

For the 2023-2024 school year, Enhanced Student Achievement (ESA) funding, formerly national school lunch state categorical funding, was \$1,613 per student receiving free or reduced-price meals for districts with free and reduced lunch percentage of 90% or greater, \$1,076 for percentages of 70% up to 89%, and \$538 for percentages below 70%. For school districts that were to receive funding based on a different per student amount than the preceding school year due to a percentage change in students receiving free or reduced-price meals, funding would be increased or decreased in each year of a three-year transition period by one-third of the difference between the amount of funding per student for the current year and the prior year, adjusted for changes in rates. A district that experienced significant growth, defined by rule as 1%, in enrolled students in each of the previous three years would receive funding for the expected increase in the number of free and reduced lunch students based on the three-year average growth in enrollment, multiplied by the percentage of students eligible for ESA funding, multiplied by the appropriate per-student funding amount.

ENHANCED TRANSPORTATION FUNDING

This program provided supplemental funding for school districts that experienced high transportation costs. The program originated from the Arkansas Legislature's 2014 Interim Study on Education Adequacy. Funds are disbursed to school districts as outlined in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2309.

GIFTED AND TALENTED

This program provided salary support for Gifted and Talented program specialists in the education service cooperatives; funding for Arkansas Governor's School, Outstanding Gifted Program Awards for school districts, summer student enrichment programs, and other contributions; and funding for the Arkansans for Gifted and Talented Education (AGATE) conference and the Arkansas Association of Gifted Education Administrators conference.

GRANTS TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS

This payment reimbursed the Lead Hill School District for the cost of educating students in northern Arkansas who could not reach their assigned district because Bull Shoals Lake separates them from it. Reaching their assigned district would require a round trip of more than 35 miles.

HUMAN DEVELOPMENT CENTER EDUCATION AID

This program provided \$526,150 to the Department of Human Services for educational services for children at the Conway Human Development Center, the only center in the State that provides special education to children in grades K through 12 with severe disabilities.

INTERVENTION BLOCK GRANTS

The following organizations received funds to support student competitions: Arkansas Governor's Quiz Bowl, State History Day Competition, Creativity in Arkansas, Destination Imagination, and Arkansas Science Fair Association.

ISOLATED FUNDING

Because of location, density, or geographical barriers, some school districts contain areas that are not able to share resources or have unusual transportation needs. Districts that contained such areas received additional funding. Isolated Funding was provided in the 2023-2024 school year in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. §§ 6-20-601 – 6-20-603.

MINIMUM TEACHER SALARY

Act 237 of 2023, the LEARNS Act, amended Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-2403 to require classroom teachers to be paid a minimum base salary of \$50,000 beginning in 2023-2024. Teachers making above \$50,000 in 2022-2023 were to receive a minimum salary increase of \$2,000 in 2023-2024. Funding was to be provided in the 2023-2024 school year to increase the salaries of teachers making \$48,000 or below in 2022-23 to the \$50,000 minimum and to increase teacher salaries of \$48,001 or greater by \$2,000. Funding was calculated based on each school district's 2022-2023 cycle 1 budgeted base salaries. To qualify for the Teacher Minimum Salary and Raise Funds in 2023-2024, districts were required to meet the following conditions: (1) revise each teacher contract by the 2023-2024 school year to require each teacher to be employed at least 190 school days each year; (2) not adopt a personnel policy, or incorporate terms into a personnel contract, that provides more rights to personnel than those provided under state law in effect during the term of the personnel contract; (3) not have a waiver of teacher salary requirements; (4) be open for on-site, in-person instruction for at least 178 days or 1,068 hours; and (5) utilize an amount of state funds equal to 80% or more of the amount allocated for school-level personnel salaries, according to the adequacy funding matrix recommended by the Senate Committee on Education and the House Committee on Education for the previous school year, for teacher salaries and teacher raises. If meeting the 80% requirement would impact student safety or potentially cause a school district to go into fiscal distress under the Arkansas Fiscal Assessment and Accountability Program (Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-1901 et seq.), the public school district may apply to the State Board of Education for a waiver from this requirement. Teacher Minimum Salary and Raise Funds are to be expended only for teacher salaries and benefits.

NATIONAL BOARD OF PROFESSIONAL TEACHING STANDARDS

Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-413(a)(1)(A) calls for state support in three distinct areas related to advanced national teacher certification: (1) bonuses to National Board Certified Teachers (NBCT), (2) participation fees and substitute pay required for candidacy, and (3) a support system for those candidates. This program encourages teachers to seek certification by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards by competitively awarding the \$2,500 application fee and up to three days of substitute teacher pay. A person registering for candidacy after January 1, 2018, will receive a \$2,500 annual bonus for five years, upon certification, if the NBCT teaches in a low-poverty school. A person registering for candidacy after January 1, 2018, will receive a \$5,000 annual bonus for five years, upon certification, if the NBCT teaches in a high-poverty school. ADE shall pay a yearly incentive bonus of \$5,000 for no more than 10 school years or, in the case of a recertification obtained before January 1, 2018, for the life of the recertification. A NBCT with a current certificate, who teaches in a high-poverty school AND a high-poverty district or a high-poverty charter school, will receive an annual bonus of \$10,000 for up to 10 years unless the school or district's poverty status changes. Any NBCT teaching in a high-poverty school and a high-poverty district will be allowed to renew one time to complete the 10-year maximum. Funding is also distributed to designated candidate "support centers" at various school districts, education service cooperatives, or institutions of higher education to assist candidates with the National Board certification process. Support center location funding is based on candidate distribution throughout the State. Teachers who do not achieve certification during the required three years must reimburse all state funds expended on their behalf.

NON-TRADITIONAL LICENSURE GRANTS

This program supplemented the cash-funded Alternative Certification program developed by ADE for certifying individuals to teach who have expertise and knowledge in a particular subject but do not have the standard teaching certificate. This program is a "Teaching and Learning" Non-Traditional Licensure Program (NTLP) for those with a college degree in areas other than education. This program was developed by the Arkansas Legislature for the purpose of meeting teacher shortages in critical parts of the State. Recognizing that professionals' experience, knowledge, and previous career successes can positively impact the lives of students, NTLP allows mature career changers, with a variety of work experiences, to teach in public school classrooms. For the 2023-2024 school year, 90 NTLP teachers received up to \$1,000 for teaching in geographic and/or subject areas with critical teacher shortages.

OPEN-ENROLLMENT CHARTER SCHOOL FACILITIES FUNDING

Funding was provided to open-enrollment public charter schools for the lease, purchase, renovation, repair, construction, installation, restoration, alteration, modification, or operation and maintenance of an approved academic facility. To be eligible for these funds, open-enrollment public charter schools must have successfully completed the charter approval process; must not use virtual technology as the primary method of delivering instruction; must meet all applicable health, fire, and safety codes; must not be classified as in academic distress or a priority school; and must not be in probationary status.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUNDING

This program provided a coordinated set of planned learning activities for teachers and administrators that are standards-based. These activities should result in individual, school-wide, and system-wide improvements designed to ensure that all students demonstrate proficiency in meeting state academic standards. For the 2023-2024 fiscal year, Professional Development Funding per district was up to \$41 multiplied by the district's Average Daily Membership for the previous school year. Additionally, ADE paid Arkansas PBS \$2,744,350 of the up to \$3.5 million authorized each year for the Internet Delivered Education for Arkansas Schools (IDEAS) system for teacher professional development and educational resources.

PUBLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEES INSURANCE

These programs pay a sum determined by the General Assembly to the to the Arkansas Department of Transformation and Shared Services - Employee Benefits Division to supplement school districts' contributions to the public school employees' health insurance program and also funded the monthly health insurance cost per employee for employees of education service cooperatives, vocational centers, Easter Seals, and the Department of Correction school.

REDUCED LUNCH

The National School Lunch Program (NSLP) is a federally assisted meal program operating in public schools. It provides nutritionally balanced, low-cost or free lunches to children each school day. The NSLP covers a portion of the meal cost for students who fall between 130% and 185% of the federal poverty line. Act 565 of 2023 minimizes the burden on these families by creating a way for each student who qualifies for reduced price meals to receive those meals for free.

RESIDENTIAL CENTERS/JUVENILE DETENTION

Funds were disbursed to school districts for educational costs of students ages 3 through 21 in approved residential psychiatric and drug/alcohol treatment facilities or juvenile detention centers. Reimbursement for residential facilities was made at a daily rate (\$60) established by ADE. Reimbursement for juvenile detention centers was calculated at the rate of foundation funding multiplied by the number of approved beds. When reimbursement requests exceeded funds available, reimbursements were prorated.

RISE ARKANSAS

R.I.S.E. (Reading Initiative for Student Excellence) Arkansas encourages a culture of reading by coordinating a statewide reading campaign with community partners, parents, and teachers to establish the importance of reading in homes, schools, and communities.

Three goals align with the work done through the grant:

Goal 1: Sharpen the focus and strengthen instruction.

Goal 2: Create community collaboration.

Goal 3: Build a culture of reading.

The RISE grant provides strategic supports to current and future educators implementing the science of reading in grades K-6 to support students meeting grade-level expectations for reading and writing. This grant also provides strategic support to meet the needs of educators as they build toward proficiency in the science of reading, including professional learning throughout the year and job-embedded supports that are research and evidence-based.

SCHOOL FACILITY JOINT USE SUPPORT

These funds are used to promote opportunities for physical activity for rural Arkansans and were awarded to districts through a competitive grant application. Grantees establish formal Joint Use Agreement partnerships with local municipalities or local nonprofit organizations as a way to make recreational spaces available for community use while school is not in session and students are not present. The intent of the program was to encourage schools to allow their indoor and outdoor facilities to be used by the public and the community as accessible and safe environments for community and family activity.

SCHOOL FOOD SERVICES

This program, combined with the Surplus Commodities program, provided the state match for the total school food program in local schools. These grants were paid to school districts at a rate based on the number of lunches served.

SCHOOL RECOGNITION PROGRAM

The Arkansas School Recognition Program (authorized by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-15-2107) provides awards to the top 10% of schools that achieve high student performance on the state-required assessments in grades 3 through 10. Awards also are given to the top 10% of public schools that achieve high student academic growth, which includes high school graduation rates where applicable.

SERIOUS OFFENDER PROGRAM

Serious Offender Units for juveniles are operated by the Department of Human Services (DHS) - Division of Youth Services (DYS), but ADE pays the educational costs of students located in these units through a Memorandum of Understanding with DHS. The current program has been in effect since 1996 for the purpose of generating educational funds for the DYS Juvenile Treatment Centers Program. DYS was provided funds based on the average daily attendance of students in the facility.

SMART START/SMART STEP

This grant program supports a state network of literacy and mathematics specialists who assist school stakeholders with professional learning throughout the year to maintain a highly-qualified teaching staff. In addition, this grant program provided professional learning opportunities to all K-12 educators through statewide conferences, regional workshops, and satellite-delivered meetings. All K-12 schools are provided evidence-based resources and materials to support teaching and learning, including professional books and videos.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – CATASTROPHIC OCCURRENCES

This program assisted school districts with special education students who required extraordinary support services, such as full-time registered nurses or elaborate assistive technology. The special education and related services these students required were unduly expensive, extraordinary, or beyond the routine costs associated with special education. Reimbursements from this program could be sought only after eligible costs for the child equaled or exceeded \$15,000 and Medicaid, federal IDEA Part B 611, and available third-party funds were applied to the catastrophic occurrence.

SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

This program provided funding to support the provision of Extended School Year (ESY) services to eligible students with disabilities in need of such services, special education services to children with disabilities who were wards of the State, and funding to support the payment of salaries to special education supervisors. Funding was provided to school districts to support the salaries of special education supervisors based on a per child basis. In addition, funding was provided to school districts and education service cooperatives for ESY services.

SPECIAL NEEDS ISOLATED FUNDING

This program provided additional funding to school districts that contained isolated school areas and met criteria for small school district funding. As stipulated in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-604, school districts containing isolated school areas had to meet certain eligibility requirements, including involvement in a consolidation or annexation, low student density ratios, and certain Average Daily Membership levels. Pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-604(h), any funds appropriated for isolated funding and/or special needs isolated funding that remained after the initial distributions were equally divided and distributed among districts that received isolated special needs funding, other than small school district funding to be used for transportation costs of isolated school areas.

STATE FOUNDATION FUNDING

This funding was distributed in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2305(a). For the 2023-2024 school year, state foundation funding was computed as the annual foundation funding amount per student (\$7,618) multiplied by the Average Daily Membership (ADM) of the previous school year less the sum of 98% of the uniform rate of tax (25 mills) multiplied by the property assessment of the school district and miscellaneous funds of the school district calculated under Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2308. The funding for charter schools used the same amount of per-student foundation funding but used the ADM of the prior or current school year, as required by law. ADM is the total number of days of school attended plus the total number of days absent by students in grades K through 12 during the first three quarters of each school year, divided by the number of school days actually taught in the school district during that time period, rounded up to the nearest hundredth.

For the 2023-2024 school year, \$1,904,463,094 and \$196,113,369 were calculated as State Foundation Funding Aid for traditional school districts and open-enrollment charter schools, respectively. Variances between these calculations and the amounts distributed, as reported in Attachment 2, are caused by prior-year adjustments, timing differences, and the recoupment of funds from school districts that collected over 98% of the uniform rate of tax.

STUDENT GROWTH

This program provides supplemental funding to school districts that have a growth in students over the previous school year. Pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2305(c)(2)(A), student growth funding is comprised of four calculations. Student growth funding is calculated as the sum of the following amounts: One quarter (1/4) of the current foundation funding amount of per-student foundation, as established by the General Assembly, multiplied by the increase, if any, in the school district's previous fiscal year fourth quarter Average Daily Membership (ADM) compared to the fiscal year three-quarter ADM in the year prior to the aforementioned fourth quarter ADM; current fiscal year first quarter ADM compared to the prior fiscal year three-quarter ADM; current fiscal year second quarter ADM compared to the prior fiscal year three-quarter ADM; and current fiscal year third quarter ADM compared to the prior fiscal year three-quarter ADM.

TEACHER INCENTIVE

The Merit Teacher Incentive Fund Program was created to recognize and reward excellent teachers across the State of Arkansas. A teacher deemed eligible under the program may be awarded annual bonuses of no more than \$10,000, if funds are available. To be eligible for funds, a teacher must have an annual rating of "effective" or "highly effective" on a state-approved evaluation system. All applicants must demonstrate a positive impact on student growth to be eligible to receive an award. Other eligibility requirements are considered in addition to growth. To be eligible for an award from the Merit Teacher Incentive Fund Program, an applicant must be:

- A teacher who holds a valid Arkansas educator's license.
- An aspiring teacher participating in a yearlong residency.

The applicant must demonstrate outstanding growth in student performance as determined by the State's value-added measure system, serve as a mentor to aspiring teachers who are participating in a yearlong residency, teach in a subject area identified as experiencing a critical shortage of teachers, or teach in a geographical area identified as experiencing a critical shortage of teachers. Individuals qualifying shall receive funds by June 30 of each year. The following factors may be considered when determining distribution:

- A teacher's value-added growth score from the previous year.
- The poverty level of the school.
- The designated performance rating of the school under the school rating system per Ark. Code Ann. § 6-15-2101 et seq.

A teacher who, in the previous school year, was in intensive support status under the Teacher Excellence and Support System (Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-2801 et seq., per Section 6.13) is ineligible for receipt of funds under the program for the subsequent school year. Funds awarded as part of the Merit Teacher Incentive Fund Program shall be provided to a recipient's employing school district and include fringe benefits for the award recipient.

TEACHER LICENSURE/MENTORING

This program covers the Arkansas Induction Program for new teachers and administrators, which provides mentoring for support, retention, and professional growth of new educators.

Per ADE Rules Governing Educator Support and Development, novice teacher mentoring resources are coordinated regionally through the Department using grants with educational partners. The grant funds a mentoring program specialist who coordinates the use of additional grant monies to ensure novice teachers receive mentoring that (1) provides training and support to increase teacher retention; (2) establishes norms of professionalism; and (3) leads to improved student achievement by increasing effective teacher performance. Grant funds will also be used to provide licensure assessment support to individuals who need to obtain an assessment score that will qualify them for licensure.

The Arkansas Association for Educational Administrators facilitates the mentoring support for novice administrators in a similar process as the educational cooperatives. The Beginning Administrator Program provides support to new administrators to enhance their effectiveness in the day-to-day operations of the school environment. It enhances new administrators' leadership skills by enabling them to provide quality feedback to teachers on their instructional practices. The program provides support to new administrators that increases the desire to remain in an administrative role, while allowing them to have a measurable impact on student learning.

The mentoring programs are aligned to the State's teacher and administrator support and evaluation systems. Online competency-based professional learning opportunities are available to support the individual professional growth needs of educators. Funds are used to pay for the development of competency-based professional learning and the content delivery platform.

Funds are also distributed to school districts, institutions of higher education, and education service cooperatives to provide training and support to all educators.

TEACHER OF THE YEAR

In submitting an application for Arkansas Teacher of the Year, a school district agreed that, if its teacher candidate were selected, the district would place the teacher on paid administrative leave for the school year immediately following his or her selection, as provided in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-2504. During the school year in which the Arkansas Teacher of the Year was on paid administrative leave, ADE reimbursed the district for the salary and benefits of the Teacher of the Year, as provided in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-2505. During this time, the Teacher of the Year served in an advisory position as a non-voting member of the State Board of Education.

TEACHER RETIREMENT MATCHING

These payments consisted of employer matching payments for employees of the education service cooperatives, vocational centers, Easter Seals program, and the Department of Correction school. The matching rate was 15% of salaries for all employees.

TEACHER SALARY EQUALIZATION

To assist in addressing the disparities in teacher salaries within Arkansas and compared to surrounding states, Act 680 of 2021 created the Teacher Salary Equalization Fund to provide public school districts and open-enrollment charter schools with additional funding dedicated to increasing teacher salaries. Equalization funding is provided to districts and charter schools that have an average annual teacher salary below the statewide target average annual salary set by the legislature. Equalization funding is continuous and will increase if a district's ADM increases. The legislature may also increase the state target average and the amount of per-student funding as part of the adequacy review process. Funding will not decrease below the amount a district receives in the initial base year, even if ADM decreases. The goals of the legislature in providing equalization funding include regular increases in the state average salary, an improved state ranking for average salary among Southern Regional Education Board (SREB) states, a continuous reduction in the gap between the highest and lowest average salary and starting salary in the State, lower rates of teacher attrition, and an increased number of districts with a starting salary above the minimum required by statute. To achieve these goals, at a minimum, districts and charter schools use equalization funds to meet or exceed the state minimum salary requirements in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-2403 each year. Districts and charter schools may also use equalization funds to increase or add to local minimum salary schedules and for salaries and benefits paid out of the teacher salary fund.

TECHNOLOGY GRANTS

This program provided technology to education service cooperatives and school districts for programs such as the EAST Initiative, Explore-Net and K-12 Cyber Security trainings and initiatives. The EAST Initiative gives students the experience of using technology to solve real-life school or community problems. The Center for Quality Teaching and Learning trains facilitators from other states as well as Arkansas teachers and students. Explore-Net teaches students computer repair in a hands-on environment and connects teams with teachers and administrative personnel with technology integration. This program also supported EAST Core as part of the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Initiative. EAST Core incorporates best practices of the EAST model into core classes. It also covers data tools development to promote effective use of educational data at the state and local education levels to support continued statewide use of data to inform decision-making.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

These funds were paid to the Public Employees Claims Division of the Arkansas Insurance Department to cover the costs of workers' compensation claims by public, school employees during the school year. Claims and administration expenses are paid by a fund transfer to the Miscellaneous Revolving Fund based on the previous year's claims. This appropriation is the claims made before 1994-1995, when districts were required by Act 862 of 1993 to provide their own workers' compensation coverage.

YOUTH SHELTERS

This program partially reimbursed school districts for additional costs of providing educational services to students who were placed in emergency youth shelters by the Department of Human Services. Funds were distributed to applicable districts with youth shelters using a calculation of the appropriated amount divided by the number of available beds in designated youth shelters.

98% UNIFORM RATE OF TAX ACTUAL COLLECTION ADJUSTMENT

For a school district that received state foundation funding aid and whose net revenues were less than the sum of 98% of the Uniform Rate of Tax (URT) multiplied by the property assessment of the district, ADE distributed to the district the difference between the district's net revenues and the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the district's property assessment.

For a district whose net revenues were more than the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the property assessment of the district, ADE recouped from the district the difference between the district's net revenues and the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the district's property assessment. Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2305(a)(4) enabled ADE to collect excess distributions by withholding funds from state foundation funding aid disbursements to the district in the following year.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

The Academic Facilities Partnership Program was promulgated pursuant to Acts 1426 and 2206 of 2005, codified as Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2507. This program provided state financial assistance in the form of cash payments to school districts for eligible new construction projects. A new construction project includes any improvement to an academic facility and, if necessary, related areas (such as the physical plant and grounds) that made the condition or efficiency of the academic facility better than its original condition of completeness or efficiency. New construction included additions to existing academic facilities, construction of new academic facilities, and projects that corrected deficiencies through new construction to maintain a safe, dry, and healthy facility. Funding for this program may be carried forward each fiscal year until project completion.

ALTERNATIVE CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

Non-traditional licensure teachers selected a site from multiple locations across Arkansas to complete instructional requirements for the Arkansas Professional Educator Pathway (ArPEP), formerly known as the Arkansas Professional Pathway to Educator Licensure (APPEL). Grants from the program fees remitted by the teachers seeking licensure were provided to the non-traditional licensure sites to conduct training.

ARKANSAS MEDICAID ADMINISTRATION CLAIMING

The ADE School Health Services Unit, along with the Department of Human Services (DHS) - Division of Medical Services, received federal approval from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to coordinate and manage a statewide Medicaid administrative claiming program referred to as Arkansas Medicaid Administrative Claiming (ARMAC). ARMAC allowed school districts to receive reimbursement for costs associated with certain administrative activities that directly supported the Arkansas Medicaid program from DHS through ADE.

CHILD CARE GRANTS, PROTECTIVE SERVICES, AND GENERAL FOSTER CARE

In addition to the federal Child Care Development Block Grant (CCDF), the Office of Early Childhood receives State General Revenue funds, which it utilizes to meet the requirement for the state match on the CCDF funds. The Office uses these funds to pay for early childhood education services for children in foster care and protective services. These children are referred by the Department of Human Services - Division of Children and Family Services.

COMPUTER SCIENCE INITIATIVE

ADE awarded Computers Science stipends, reimbursements, and grants to teachers, school districts, and educational cooperatives to promote computer science education and build local capacity for computer science instruction. Funding was also provided by donations from outside entities, such as ARCodeKids, to pay for programs and state coding competitions, which included student awards and competition expenses.

EDUCATIONAL FREEDOM ACCOUNTS

Educational Freedom Accounts is a school choice initiative that provides funding for eligible students to attend participating private schools. For the 2023-2024 school year, \$6,672 per Educational Freedom Account (\$7,413 for 2022-2023 Succeed Scholarship recipients) was to be disbursed quarterly to participating schools and service providers on behalf of participating families. Payments are sent directly to participating schools and service providers through a digital wallet and accounts payable platform.

EDUCATOR RISING

Educator Rising Grants of \$5,000 each were awarded to the six Regional Coordinators at educational service cooperatives and institutions of higher education to host regional EdRising virtual events and to work with regional partners and school districts to strengthen the presence of EdRising in the State. Grant funds paid the registration fees for students, teacher leaders, and ADE Division of Elementary and Secondary Education representatives to attend the National Educators Rising Virtual Conference. The Education and Training Taskforce convened a wide, diverse group of stakeholders to provide feedback on the current state of the Education and Training cluster in Arkansas and help develop a plan to grow the presence of this cluster in Arkansas schools. The grant supported summer trainings for EdRising teacher leaders, district leadership, and college partners.

EXTRAORDINARY CIRCUMSTANCES

The Academic Facilities Extraordinary Circumstances Program, codified as Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2507, provided state financial assistance in the form of cash payments to school districts that the General Assembly deemed did not have sufficient means to contribute local resources necessary to complete academic facilities projects.

LEAD AND MASTER PROFESSIONAL EDUCATOR

Lead and Master Professional Educator designation supports the training of experienced mentor teachers as they support novice teachers. Along with the prescribed training, the program also provides embedded coaching training in which experienced mentor teachers develop coaching techniques, including collecting evidence, guiding teacher self-reflection, and providing actionable feedback. The program increases their ability to help novice teachers through challenging situations, expand their planning skills, and build resilience.

MATH CURRICULUM GRANT

The ADE Division of Elementary and Secondary Education was awarded a \$3 million grant from the Walton Family Foundation to fund high-quality tier 1 mathematics curriculum (T1MC) in schools across the State. The purpose of the grant is to award local education agencies competitive subgrants to select and implement high-quality instructional materials that support the Arkansas Initiative for Instructional Materials (AIIM) and the AR Math QuEST goals.

MULTIPLE GRANT AWARD PROGRAM

Grants are provided as needed to provide leadership, support, and service to schools, districts, and communities so every student graduates prepared for college, career, and community engagement.

OFFICE OF EARLY CHILDHOOD OPERATIONS

The Office of Early Childhood administers the CCDF program in the State, utilizing both CCDF and State General Revenue.

OPEN ENROLLMENT CHARTER SCHOOL CLOSURE

This appropriation was established to allow ADE to pay outstanding debts incurred by a closed open enrollment charter school. When an open enrollment school closes, the assets and outstanding debts of that school are transferred to ADE pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-23-105.

SAVE THE CHILDREN

This program provides grants for statewide after-school literacy, nutrition, home visiting, and early childhood programs to be administered by Save the Children for low income, at-risk children.

SCHOOL SAFETY GRANTS

School safety grant funds are awarded to public schools, open-enrollment charter schools, and other educational entities to aid in implementing the recommendations of the School Safety Commission final reports (2018 and 2022) and the Arkansas L.E.A.R.N.S. plan, as well as aid in providing a safe school environment for students and staff. This grant has been approved for 299 Arkansas schools.

STATE'S MAINTENANCE OF EQUITY – ESSER FUNDS

State funds are being provided by this discretionary grant to ensure state maintenance of equity as required by the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Fiscal year 2024 funds represent supplemental state support based on the 2023 fiscal year, as needed according to the maintenance of equity calculations mandated by the federal regulations. These funds are unrestricted revenue and can be used for any needs of the local education agency (LEA) within its general operating fund. Additionally, these funds are one-time revenue and should not be budgeted in future years.

STEM CURRICULUM

The Walton Family Foundation has awarded the Arkansas Department of Elementary and Secondary Education \$2.9 million in funds to assist in the implementation of Project Lead The Way (PLTW) Gateway for schools serving students in grades 7-8. The grant will cover the cost of training and materials to ensure a high-quality supplemental Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) curriculum. Courses included Automation and Robotics, Flight and Space, Design and Modeling, and Medical Detectives. Through PLTW Gateway, schools will be able to leverage STEM education and foster interest in STEM-related employment opportunities.

TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD

This program distributed awards to teachers who were recognized as regional Teacher of the Year winners. These regional winners were selected at the state level from teachers nominated by their local school districts. One teacher from each region was selected to receive a \$1,000 cash award. The top four regional finalists each received an additional \$1,000 cash award. The Arkansas Teacher of the Year winner received a final award of \$14,000 from the Walton Family Foundation.

ARKANSAS AWARE – SAFE SCHOOLS (AL# 93.243)

This program, funded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, is designed to develop model comprehensive school-based mental health programs and build the capacity of educators to identify and address the needs of students.

ARKANSAS LITERACY (AL# 84.371C)

The Comprehensive Literacy State Development Grant is a federal grant issued by the U.S. Department of Education to advance literacy skills, including pre-literacy skills, reading, and writing, for students from birth through grade 12, including English learners and students with disabilities. Over the next five years, the Division of Elementary and Secondary Education will use these funds to engage families in literacy by providing access to books, materials, resources, and activities. In addition, the Division will develop high-quality professional development to support evidence-based literacy instruction and provide competitive grants that support effective literacy instruction grounded in the science of reading.

CARES, CRRSA, AND ARP ACTS (AL# 93.981, 84.425, 84.027, 84.173, 10.568, 10.182, 93.575)

CARES ACT COORDINATED SCHOOL HEALTH – COVID SUPPLEMENT 2A

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) funded supplemental services for schools related to COVID-19 to address student mental health and well-being and to enhance the work around mental health by developing a foundational structure for positive behavioral supports.

ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL EMERGENCY RELIEF FUND

Under the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund established as part of the Education Stabilization Fund in the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES) Act, state educational agencies awarded subgrants to local educational agencies to address the impact of COVID-19 on elementary and secondary schools. This program represents formula grants to districts and a small portion for state administration and state activity. The focus is on food security, direct student support/learning opportunities, and technology and systemic procedures.

EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE TO NON-PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 (CRRSA Act), provided \$2.75 billion for the Emergency Assistance to Non-Public Schools (EANS) program, which is part of the Governor's Emergency Education Relief Fund. Under the EANS program, the U.S. Department of Education awarded grants by formula to each Governor with an approved Certification and Agreement to provide services or assistance to eligible non-public schools to address the impact that COVID-19 has had, and continues to have, on non-public school students and teachers in the State.

The American Rescue Plan Act included \$2.75 billion for the American Rescue Plan's Emergency Assistance to Non-Public Schools (ARP EANS) program. These funds remain available through September 30, 2024, for making allocations to Governors to provide services or assistance to non-public schools that enroll a significant percentage of low income students most impacted by the qualifying emergency.

GOVERNOR'S EMERGENCY EDUCATION RELIEF (GEER) FUND

Under the GEER Fund, the U.S. Department of Education awarded grants by formula to Governors for the purpose of providing local educational agencies, institutions of higher education, and other education-related entities with emergency assistance to address the impact that the coronavirus pandemic has had, and continues to have, on students and parents across the nation. This includes both continuing to provide educational services while schools and campuses are closed and supporting the on-going functionality of those schools and campuses.

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT

The purpose of the grant is to provide eligible local educational agencies (LEAs), including charter schools that are LEAs, with emergency relief funds to address the impact that COVID-19 has had, and continues to have, on elementary and secondary schools across the nation. American Rescue Plan (ARP) ESSER funds must be obligated by September 30, 2024.

Additional ARP funds were also awarded for the Child Care Development Fund Block grants and the Child and Adult Food Care programs.

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH PROGRAMS

The purpose of the grant, under section 2001(b)(1) of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP), is to identify homeless children and youth; provide wraparound services in light of the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic; and provide the assistance needed to enable homeless children and youth to attend school and participate fully in school activities, including in-person instruction, summer learning, and enrichment programs. This grant must be awarded by a competitive grant process. ARP Homeless I funds must be obligated by September 30, 2024.

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT SPECIAL EDUCATION PRESCHOOL

The purpose of the supplementary IDEA funds is to provide eligible local educational agencies (LEAs), including charter schools that are LEAs, with supplementary IDEA funds to address the impact that COVID-19 has had, and continues to have, on elementary and secondary schools across the nation at the Early Childhood level (3-5). These funds follow the same allowable cost guidelines as IDEA Part B Section 619 funds. ARP IDEA funds must be obligated by September 30, 2023.

AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT SPECIAL EDUCATION SCHOOL AGE

The purpose of the supplementary IDEA funds is to provide eligible local educational agencies (LEAs), including charter schools that are LEAs, with supplementary IDEA funds to address the impact that COVID-19 has had, and continues to have, on elementary and secondary schools across the nation at the school age level (5-21). These funds follow the same allowable cost guidelines as IDEA Part B Section 611 funds. ARP IDEA funds must be obligated by September 30, 2023.

CHILD AND ADULT CARE FOOD PROGRAM (AL# 10.558 & 10.559)

The Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) is a federal program that provides reimbursements for nutritious meals and snacks to eligible children and adults who are enrolled for care at participating childcare centers, day care homes, and adult day care centers.

In addition, through SUN Meals, children of all ages can eat meals and snacks during the summer at no cost at participating schools, parks, and other neighborhood locations. Participating locations receive a reimbursement for the nutritious meals and snacks served to eligible children.

CHILD CARE DEVELOPMENT FUND BLOCK GRANT (AL# 93.575)

The Child Care Development Block Grant is administered by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families (ACF). CCDBG provides block grants to states, territories, and tribal entities, which are responsible for distributing the funding according to the block grant requirements, including childcare assistance to eligible low income families, families transitioning from Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF), and children in foster care/protective services.

The ADE Office of Early Childhood (OEC) is the lead agency responsible for distributing this funding in Arkansas. The Child Care Development Fund (funding from CCDBG) program is used to provide childcare services and includes requirements for licensing, professional development, and quality initiatives.

CHILD NUTRITION DISCRETIONARY GRANTS (AL# 10.579)

This program provided equipment grants for certain equipment purchases at eligible school food authorities.

CHILD NUTRITION FARM TO SCHOOL (AL# 10.645)

The purpose of the Child Nutrition Farm to School Grant (USDA Formula Grant) is to support state agencies efforts to implement and expand farm to school activity among institutions participating in Child Nutrition Programs. Funding objectives include: 1) to build and increase the capacity of participating institutions to procure and use local food in program meals; and/or 2) to provide agricultural education opportunities for participating children.

CHILD NUTRITION SUPPLY CHAIN (AL# 10.555)

These federal funds were provided to school food authorities to enhance their ability to purchase unprocessed or minimally processed domestic foods for school meals by offering resources needed to address supply chain challenges.

COORDINATED SCHOOL HEALTH (AL# 93.981)

This program, funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), supports evidence-based strategies and activities to reduce the risk of children and adolescents developing chronic disease in the future, manage chronic conditions prevalent in student populations, and improve academic success.

EDUCATION FOR HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH (AL# 84.196)

This program provided funds to schools for supportive services and activities that facilitate the educational success of homeless children and youth.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ACQUISITION STATE GRANTS (AL# 84.365)

This program provided grants to schools to ensure that limited English-proficient children and youth, including immigrant children and youth, obtain English proficiency and meet state academic standards.

FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLE PROGRAM (AL# 10.582)

The purpose of the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program is (1) to provide access to fresh fruits and vegetables for students in low income public schools at times other than regular meal periods, (2) to assist local farmers by expanding local markets for locally-grown fresh fruits and vegetables, and (3) to create local partnerships between schools and the state agriculture industry.

HEADSTART AND EARLY HEADSTART (AL# 93.600)

The ADE Office of Early Childhood (OEC) serves as the grantee for an Early Head Start-Child Care Partnership (EHS-CCP) federal grant program. This program serves 168 children, aged birth to age 3, and families in seven different communities or cities in Arkansas. OEC contracts with Community Services Office (CSO), a community action nonprofit agency located in Hot Springs. CSO then contracts with seven different early childhood centers in various cities and communities in the State to provide high quality early childhood services to the children and families they serve.

IMPROVING TEACHER QUALITY STATE GRANTS (AL# 84.367)

This program provided grants to school districts to assist with effectively recruiting and retaining highly-qualified teachers and to provide professional development activities.

MIGRANT EDUCATION – STATE GRANT PROGRAM (AL# 84.011)

These funds supported high-quality education programs for migratory children and helped ensure that migratory children who moved among states were not penalized in any manner by disparities among states in curriculum, graduation requirements, state academic content, and/or student academic achievement standards. Funds also ensured that migratory children were provided appropriate education services (including supportive services) that addressed their special needs and received full and appropriate opportunities to meet the same challenging state academic content and student academic achievement standards that all children were expected to meet.

NATIONAL SCHOOL BREAKFAST AND LUNCH PROGRAMS (AL# 10.553 & 10.555)

These programs assisted schools in making school breakfasts, lunches, and snacks available to all school children and encouraging the domestic consumption of nutritious agricultural commodities.

PRESCHOOL DEVELOPMENT (AL# 93.434)

Preschool Development Grant Birth through Five (PDG B-5) is a competitive federal grant designed to improve states' early childhood systems by building upon existing federal, state, and local care and learning investments. The grant supports early childhood services for children birth to age five, including local leads, needs assessment, strategic planning, family engagement, quality improvement, and early childhood workforce supports. The program aims to strengthen early childhood systems, prepare children for kindergarten, and expand access to high-quality early childhood care and education.

RURAL EDUCATION (AL# 84.358)

This program provided grants to rural schools to help improve the quality of teaching and learning in those schools.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – GRANTS TO STATES (AL# 84.027)

This program provided grants to school districts to assist in providing a free public education to all eligible children with disabilities.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – INFANTS AND TODDLERS (IDEA PART C) (AL# 84.181)

This program provides special education services to infants and toddlers from birth to age 3 to all eligible children with developmental delays or disabilities.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – MAKING IMPROVED DECISIONS FOR STUDENTS ON THE CUSP OF ALTERNATE ASSESSMENT PARTICIPATION USING MULTIPLE MEASURES OF ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT FROM MULTIPLE SOURCES (MIDAS) (AL# 84.368)

This grant funds a research project between ADE and the National Center of Education Outcomes (NCEO) to (1) increase capacity of state educational agencies (SEAs) to provide technical assistance to local educational agencies (LEAs) on using multiple measures of academic achievement to improve instructional practices for students with disabilities who move from the Alternate Assessment pathway to the general assessment pathway and (2) increase the capacity of teachers to successfully instruct these students.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – PRESCHOOL GRANTS (AL# 84.173)

This program provided supplemental grants to school districts and education service cooperatives to assist in providing a free public education to children with disabilities who are ages 3 through 5.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – STATE PERSONNEL DEVELOPMENT (AL# 84.323)

This program assisted state educational agencies in reforming and improving their systems for personnel preparation and professional development of individuals providing early intervention, educational, and transition services to improve results for children with disabilities.

STAR GRANTS (AL# 84.421)

This grant funds a research project among ADE, the University of Arkansas, Community Independent Living Services, Arkansas Rehabilitation Services, and Arkansas Transition Services to (1) implement an innovative, integrated collaboration model around seamless transition services in Arkansas; (2) increase youth career and college preparation and experience opportunities; and (3) increase knowledge and skills of youth, families, providers, and other community partners.

TITLE I GRANTS TO LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES (AL# 84.010)

This program was designed to help schools improve the teaching and learning environments of children failing or most at-risk of failing.

TITLE I STATE AGENCY PROGRAM FOR NEGLECTED AND DELINQUENT CHILDREN AND YOUTH (AL# 84.013)

The purpose of this program is to help provide educational continuity for neglected and delinquent children and youth in state-run institutions for juveniles and in adult correctional institutions so that these youth can make successful transitions to school or employment once they are released.

TITLE IV STUDENT SUPPORT AND ACADEMIC ENRICHMENT GRANTS (AL# 84.424)

This program provided grant funds to school districts to allow them to focus on safe and healthy students; integrate technology into schools to improve teaching and learning; and emphasize access to a well-rounded education that includes a wide variety of disciplines, such as music, the arts, social studies, environmental education, computer science and civics.

TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTERS (AL# 84.287)

This program provided grants to local educational agencies, faith-based organizations, and community-based entities to create community learning centers providing academic enrichment opportunities for students attending high-poverty and low-performing schools.

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
